The magnificent Citadel complex, set on four acres is characterized by uniquely shaped and circular grouped buildings, and colored a soft dusty sage. The heart of the Citadel is the 8700 Restaurant. The ceilings rise a sensational 37 feet from the floor, and interior designer, Nancy Kitchell has captured a stunning look, combining elegance with a soft, more subdued approach. As Karlyn expresses, "We wanted the people, the food and the artwork to be the focal points."

The cuisine of the 8700 Restaurant is Southwestern regional cooking with the main emphasis on locally flavored dishes, fresh meats and locally grown fowl, vegetables and herbs.

The Marque Bar (pronounced Mark) will accommodate the most elegant tastes or the most casual rancher. Barstools or rusty-toned wrought iron with cowskin are nestled near an incredible bar covered with a special slate imported from China. The most exceptional and romantic fireplace is surrounded by brands, many from the families and friends connected with the Citadel.

The Citadel is in itself, a unique and creative work of art, inspired by the majestic setting, and developed with the idea of balancing and serving the needs of the community as well as the many visitors who grace our Valley every year.
